This year marks the third GHS awareness walk for mental health. The first mental health walk was organized by graduates Lilli Vaziri and Ava Smith. This year senior Isabelle Reynolds and juniors Kara Ennis and Paige Glynn continued the tradition.

The event is geared toward raising both awareness and money to support the American Suicide Foundation. The students offered t-shirts, bracelets, stickers and pins to raise additional awareness of mental health, and Johnson County coroner, Mr. Michael Pruitt, spoke to the group about suicide and urged them not to suffer alone if they are depressed.

Reynolds shared her connection to the cause with students before kicking off the start of the walk, and all participants walked around the indoor track and played games, such as cornhole and spike ball.

"When I was there, I told a story about someone close to me who had attempted suicide. Luckily, they survived, but I blamed myself, and ever since then, mental health has been a huge thing for me," Reynolds said.

She also talked about what went into planning the walk.

"We put a lot of time into planning the event. I had to find a date and time that worked, Kara contacted the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention and got a website for donation. We also had to make decorations and games," Reynolds said.
