Students are mourning middle school student and friend James Davis, who died from a gunshot wound a few weeks ago.

The GMS staff rallied to come up with a plan to make sure students felt their needs were addressed. Some of the students felt confused and surprised that something like this could happen to someone they knew.

Bryson Bell said, "Our school had a two-hour delay in case we needed extra time to sit and think about what happened. They also gave us the option to skip school if we didn't feel ready to come back to school after such a big event."

The staff handled the situation with lots of care and comfort for kids who needed someone to talk to and someone to be there for them during this time.

"The first day back to school we had no work and only asked questions and had talks with teachers and counselors. This helped me and a lot of kids that go to Greenwood deal with it a lot easier and made us feel safe and cared for when we had many options to grieve," Addie Roll said.

A candle lighting was held at Freedom Park and lasted approximately an hour with roughly 50 students attending.

"During the candle lighting, nobody was able to actually light the candles due to the wind, so we all decided to improvise by shining our phone flashlights instead. Everyone was still able to share stories and memories that they had with James. There were a huge number of people, including one of the boys that was involved in an incident," Amirah Daughtery said.

Sophomore Lizzy Metzger, who is a member of the GHS Fellowship of Christian Athletes, decided to get the members of FCA to join her in writing notecards to each teacher who had James as a student. FCA also designed posters to hang up around the school to spread awareness.

"FCA decided to come together and send some encouragement and made a bunch of posters and cards. We wanted to do as much as we could to support as many teachers and students as possible during this difficult time," Mrs. Stephanie Senac, FCA sponsor, said.
